Minister's Message

Peace and all good!

August is the month the Church dedicates to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

What do we know about Mary's heart?

We know Mary's heart is a heart that said yes.

At the Annunciation, the Angel Gabriel declares, "Hail, O favored one! The Lord is with you!" (Lk. 1:28, NRSV). Scripture records that Mary "was greatly troubled at the saying." And once Gabriel has explained the nature of his mission, Mary is further perplexed: "How shall this be...?" (Lk. 1:34). But then: "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord" (Lk. 1:38).

There's the "yes." As I've remarked before, this isn't a "yes" of passive docility. It's a bold "yes" of faithfulness to God; of courage in the midst of what could have — were it not for another angelic intervention, in Joseph's dreams (Mt. 1:20-25) — quickly spiraled into a life-imploding disaster. Mary said "yes" for herself; and ultimately, for humanity.

We know Mary's heart is a heart that embraced mystery.

How could it be otherwise? Just imagine: Mary is told she will give birth to the Son of God — and once she does, she of course must be a parent to him. How, precisely, does one raise a deity? There's no child-rearing advice or experience that would seem to apply.

While the Scriptures are voiceless about Jesus' life from the age of 12-29 — a period referred to by Biblical scholars as the "silent", "unknown", "missing" or "lost" years — we know that after Jesus was found by Mary and Joseph in the Temple, he "went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them" (Lk. 2:51). Mary's reaction to this unnerving episode — surely among the greatest fears of any parent is the loss of a child — tells us something about her style of parenting: "His mother treasured all these things in her heart" (Lk. 2:51). She loved Jesus, and she was proud of him. Just like any mom.

We know Mary's heart is a heart that suffered.

The Immaculate heart of Mary is represented as pierced by a sword.

Not only is this an echo of Simeon's prophecy in the Temple — "...a sword will pierce your own soul, too" (Lk. 2:35) — it is a graphic representation of the sorrows she will suffer, which are traditionally numbered as seven. In addition to Simeon's prophecy, there is the flight into Egypt (Mt. 2:13-21); the loss of Jesus for three days (Lk. 2:41-50); the carrying of the cross (Jn.

19:17); the Crucifixion (Jn. 19:18-30); Jesus taken down from the cross (Jn. 19:39-40); and Jesus laid in the tomb (Jn. 19:39-42).

Our Lady's Seven Sorrows remind us that Mary was a refugee, a panicked parent, and a mother forced to witness the brutalization and tortured death of her son — accompanied by public jeers, insults, and mockery — before finally laying his battered and lifeless body in a cold tomb. (Mt. 27:38-44). The eventual triumph of the Resurrection in no way diminishes the profound pain Mary would have felt at each step of Christ's Passion.

Most of all, we know Mary's heart is a heart that loves, with the love of a mother.

In a 2012 homily, Pope Benedict XVI shared a vision of Mary's maternal love and intercession: "How does Mary exercise this queenship of service and love? By watching over us, her children: the children who turn to her in prayer, to thank her or to ask her for her motherly protection and her heavenly help, perhaps after having lost our way, or when we are oppressed by suffering or anguish because of the sorrowful and harrowing vicissitudes of life. In serenity or in life's darkness let us address Mary, entrusting ourselves to her continuous intercession so that she may obtain for us from the Son every grace and mercy we need for our pilgrimage on the highways of the world."

We fly to Thy protection, O Holy Mother of God!

Recap of Last Gathering

July 3, 2022

OPENING PRAYER:Offered by Walter Gawlak, OFS



SUMMARY OF SURVEY RESULTS:

Results were mostly agree or strongly agree. Questions are below, and areas of disagreement or comment are annotated.

- 1. I'm happy with the fraternity. One person disagrees.
- 2. The people I Tau fraternity treat each other with respect.
- 3. My opinions are taken into consideration in fraternity meetings.
- 4. The fraternity reinforces my Catholic faith and the teachings of the Church.
- 5. I look forward to attending monthly meetings. One person disagrees.
- 6. I'm glad to be part of this fraternity. One person disagrees.
- 7. I feel that I am growing in my faith by being a member of this fraternity. One person disagrees.
- 8. The duration of and frequency of fraternity meetings are appropriate. *Two people disagree; comments indicate the meetings are too long.*
- 9. I feel that the fraternity helps me to integrate Franciscan spirituality into my everyday life.
- 10. The fraternity helps me to feel connected to the activity of other Secular Franciscans at the regional, national, and international levels. Four people disagree; comments indicate that we are not connected to what is happening around the world.
- 11. Generally, the group activities outside of meetings received favorable ratings. The activities with the highest ranking are the annual retreat, days of spirituality, and Transitus.

SURVEY DISCUSSION:

Following the presentation of the survey results, members had the following comments:

- There are six Catholic churches in Uzbekistan, four of which are operated by Franciscans. We can explore the possibility of working
 with them
- Make Tau a priority. We meet once a month. Some of the information we discuss is meaty and warrants discussion. Why should we cut it short? The SFO is a way of life.
- If anyone has a legitimate reason to leave a meeting early, they should ask the Minister to excuse • them.

- Tau should respect that if some- one needs to leave early, the reason for doing so is legitimate.
- The Council should consider the timing and time allotted and assess the schedule based on comments.
- Elderly members may have issues driving in the dark. Perhaps we can begin the meetings 30 minutes earlier.
- Meetings are long because we are a large fraternity with a lot of participation.
- Another option is to move initial formation to another day in order to begin meetings earlier.
- We should consider meeting on Saturday, early in the day.

- We have to reserve the rooms eight months in advance, and we are locked in. However, we can request a change.
- Tau did fieldtrips before COVID; we could try doing more of these with a spiritual component and fellowship.
- We could attend Mass at each other's parishes.
- We should share information about our individual apostolates.
- Per the Region, we must meet in person. Virtual attendance is allowed only for excused persons. The link should be sent only to those who are excused.
- Virtual meetings are helpful to those who have to work during the meeting times.

Recap Cont'd

ONGOING FORMATION:

Walter Gawlak, OFS began Ongoing Formation discussion of Chapter Six, • "Priests by Baptism: 'Christian, Remember Your Dignity" from Habits for Holiness: Small Steps for Making . Big Spiritual Progress by Fr. Mark Mary Ames, CFR. He said that the science of Physics may answer many things, but it does not answer questions such as does life have meaning. But the metaphysical forces of love, grace, and prayer are instrumental in . answering those questions. Love is a primal force that acts for good except • when it is misguided. Prayer united with sacrifice is powerful. Saints Francis and Clare did this, which led to a revival of Christian Faith in the 13th Century. Walter guoted from Section 7 of the Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order, ". . . let them conform their thoughts and deeds to those of Christ." He suggested change "thoughts" to prayer. He asked if anyone has mapped their prayer life to create a web of prayer? (Map who you pray for and who prays for you.)

Walter asked the Fraternity to consider the following questions:

- Do you agree that the most powerful force is prayer united with sacrifice?
- Do you bring intentionality to 3. prayer?
- If you have someone in need of prayer, can you unite prayer with sacrifice for the person's intentions?
- Have you thought about making small and large sacrifices?
- Did you remember to offer up sacrifices during the sacrifice of the Mass? Was it meaningful?
- Has your prayer life changed as a result of becoming Franciscan?

Walter stated that he provided questions for small group discussions via email. The Fraternity split into small groups to discuss the questions:

1. Are there ways I am already making regular sacrifices out of fidelity to Christ? Focus on what you have prayerfully realized after having read this chapter.

- Is there a way to pay attention to the sacrifices I'm making so that I can intentionally unite them with the suffering of Christ?
- . If I don't already have the practice, can I begin interceding for those I meet throughout the day? Let's make it simple, think of one such person you've met this past week and pray retroactively.
- Is there an intention particularly close to my heart that I just don't know what to do with? Would offering nine days of prayer and sacrifice for this person or result be something I feel motivated to do? This sacrifice should be above and beyond the small sacrifices you already make in union with prayer. Have you tried one day of special sacrifice, e.g., fasting or early rising?
- 5. Despite all I do, how do I feel if my prayers do not appear to be answered?

INDIVIDUAL APOSTOLATES

Did you know that Beena Job, OFS has a Master's Degree in Agricultural Economics? Accordingly, one of her apostolates is mindful gardening, which reduces waste and helps the environment. Here are simple tips from Beena!

- Put the waste of fruits and vegetables into a pot. Put soil and leaves on it and add seeds like mustard, green gram (mung beans), wheat. Give it a little water and harvest your microgreens.
- When you eat fresh fruits and veggies, put the waste back to soil. If you are in a hurry put the waste in the backyard and

- put some soil or leaves on it. In a few days the soil can be used as nutrition for your plants.
- Grow the seeds of the fruits and veggies that you eat (tomatoes, musk melon, etc.). Dig a small hole and cover it with soil so the birds don't eat it. When you see small plants growing transplant them.

If you need more encouragement, I will be sending a separate Formation Friday entitled Secular Franciscans are Stealth Evangelizers, which will explain how, by living our Rule authentically, we are evangelizing
