Our Theme for the Year is: The Eucharist: The Lord's **Body & Blood**

Greetings from Brother Lawrence

Advent comes at the opening of the new liturgical year, as I suppose that it should, but it is also a season that is bidirectional. Have you ever noticed the first two weeks of Advent are looking forward to the second coming of Jesus at the world's end and the second two weeks are looking backwards to the first coming in that little town of Bethlehem so many years ago? This leaves Advent to have an anticipation of the second coming and a reminder of the first coming. It is truly a unique season in that sense. There are other unique things that happen with the season. The day before Halloween I had to go to a craft store and there were few Halloween items in the store because they had already been replaced by Christmas decorations and such. Perhaps Halloween is the new Thanksgiving and someday Labor Day may replace Halloween. Strange to think that but, after all, Black Friday events now begins in early November. What a world in which we live.

Being Franciscan, we should find these things repulsive. Being Franciscan should help us to recognize that we are only in this world for a limited time and that it is during this time that we should seek to follow in the path laid out for us by Jesus, and that means following life in accordance with God's Will and not the world's will, if you will. In my religion classes, when I am teaching the sacrament of Baptism, I first cover Jesus' Baptism by John and show that there are, in all four Gospel accounts, the same five events in His Baptism: the actual Baptism with water, the rending open of the sky (for communication from God), the descending of the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove, God's announcement of who Jesus is, and, finally, the Holy Spirit leading Jesus on to His mission for which He was sent. Then I teach the students that these same five things happen with each of us at our own Baptism: the Baptism with water, the opening for communication from God of who we now are, the descending of the Holy Spirit within us for life, God's recognition of us as son or daughter of God, and, finally, the leading of us by the Holy Spirit on our own journey of life (what the scripture often refer to as 'on the path' or 'way'. This last event is a lifetime for each of us in following Jesus in doing God's Will. Cont. on page 3

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Minister's Moment

When we lived in Georgia, the Hispanic community introduced me to Novenas. December starts with the Novena for Our Lady of Guadalupe (Dec 4 to Dec 12), Saint Lucia (Dec 5-13), and then there are the Posadas (Dec 16 to Dec 24). Perhaps the most touching memory I have of that rural community is Joseph and Mary appearing at our door asking to be let in. The tradition has you close the door while they make the request again. (Of course, everyone is then invited in for light refreshments.) How often are we closing the door to the meaning of Christmas? Maybe we are overwhelmed. (Think of Mary making a last-minute trip!) Maybe the house is messy. (Imagine sharing the stable!) Maybe we don't have the right gifts. (Thank goodness for the wise men!) Maybe there really isn't any room at the inn. (Can we get some blow up mattresses?)

Saint Francis had the right idea. We should focus ourselves on the Manger, The *Presepio*. We should breath in the smells of the stable, feel the crunch of hay under our feet, and hear choir of angels singing lullabies in the sky. We should rock the Babe in our arms. We should heed the words to the shepherds, "Do not be afraid." So, how can we prepare for the Manger? Think about letting go the things that are not serving your life or your neighbors' lives. Simplify. Christmas shouldn't be stressful. Keep the traditions that mean the most, and let the others go. Find some time to serve others. Maybe take some cookies to your neighbors or write a few cards for those in the nursing homes. Take a nature walk. Pet or feed some animals if you don't own any. Finally, set up a nativity scene, even if it is just a picture of one. Immerse yourself in it and know that God did come to be with us and is still with us today. Be gentle with yourselves. If we can make the Incarnation come alive for us as Francis did in Greccio, then Christmas will take on a new meaning. And we can truly open the door for His arrival as a newborn baby.

Have a delightful Advent Season and Merry Christmas!

So that we might more fully live the Gospel Life, Secular Franciscans should not just read *The Rule*, but reflect on and pray with *The Rule*. According to Speyer's *The Life of Saint Francis* (FA:ED, vol. 1, p. 414)

"Truly he used to say: "Let us begin, brothers, to serve God. Let us begin," he would say. "And let us make progress, because up to now we have made too little progress."

Prologue: Concerning those who do Penance: ¹All those who love the Lord with their whole heart, with their whole mind, with their whole strength (Mk 12:30) and love their neighbour as themselves, ²who hate their bodies with their vices and sins (Mt 22:39), ³who receive the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, ⁴and who produce worthy fruits of Penance. ⁵O how happy and blessed are these men and women while they do such things and persevere in doing them, 6because the Spirit of the Lord will rest upon them (Is 11:2) and make its home and dwelling place (Jn 14:23) among them, 7and they are children of the heavenly Father whose (Mt 5:45) works they do, and they are spouses, brothers and mothers of our Lord Jesus Christ (Mt 12:50).
