Our monthly meeting for May was held at Saint Michael's house and we were blessed with a beautiful overcast day, perfect for gardening and planting bee-friendly plants for our JPIC project. As the following day was World Bee Day, we even incorporated some honey snacks into our social time together. Our gospel reading was about evangelization, and we tied the theme of evangelization to the action of bees who collect pollen and carry it from one plant to another just as we should carry the gospel from one person to another.

Saint John Chrysostom once said, "The bee is more honored than other animals not because she labors, but because she labors for others!"

"In 1948 Pius XII gave a lovely address to beekeepers. He spoke about the lessons their little bewinged charges give to mankind, including conscientious attention to their appointed vocations in their community. 'Working like bees with order and peace, men would learn to enjoy and have others enjoy the fruit of their labors, the honey and the wax, the sweetness and the light in this life here below'. Pius XII was right to praise busy, selfless bees. Bees are good examples to us, who have vocations in the world and in the Church, which needs our industrious protection."


