From the Desk of Sr. Mary Therese - A SUMMER NOTE

At this time of year, plants are growing and while we drive by corn fields and other growing things, we probably experience a bit of excitement. Our Lord Jesus used nature and the process of growth to teach us about God and life in the Gospel. Recently, Pope Francis was reflecting upon the Gospel story of the sower and the seed.

Jesus describes the Kingdom of God through the image of the seed that is planted, sprouts and grows to maturity. The Lord invites us to have "confident expectation," the Pope said, as the whole process takes time and requires our trust and collaboration.

Even with quality and abundant seeds and well prepared soil, a farmer needs patience and trust, the Pope observed, as the plants do not sprout immediately. Eventually the seeds open and the shoots sprout through the soil and grow to bring an abundant harvest, revealing the underground miracle in progress, the Pope explained. He went on to say, "The Lord places in us the seeds of His word and His grace, good and abundant seeds, and, without ever ceasing to accompany us, He waits patiently." The Lord cares for us always during the process of our own growth with the confidence of a Father, the Pope said, but the Lord gives us time so that these seeds may open, grow and develop to when they "bear the fruits of good works." The Pope said the Lord wishes that nothing be lost and "everything should reach full maturity" like the ears of grain described in the Gospel.

The Lord also teaches us to "sow the Gospel confidently wherever we are" the Pope said, and then to wait patiently as the seed grows and bears fruit in us and others. Confident patience is the key, he stressed, as we should not become discouraged when we do not seem to see immediate results. The "miracle" is often at work beyond appearances, and in due course will bear abundant fruit, he assured.

So I propose two reflection questions for you over this summer growing season:

- 1. Am I open and nurturing to the seeds of the Gospel and God's grace that have been placed within me? Do I have "confident expectation" that God will bring it to fruition in my life?
- 2. How am I called to "sow the Gospel confidently" right where I am and to wait patiently for the growth that only God can give?

Franciscan Obituary



Mary Lou Gennaula, OFS

Mary L. Gennaula (Neil) OFS, formerly of Brownsville, Pa. and residing in Gettysburg (Bonneauville), passed away Sunday, June 2, after a lengthy illness. She was 79.

Mary Lou was twice widowed, preceded in death by husband Ray D. Neil (California, Pa.) and husband Charles Gennaula (California/Gettysburg). She also is predeceased by parents Stephen and Helen Kosick (LaBelle, Pa.) as well

as faithful canine companions Shaggy and Mohawk.

She was a member of the Catholic Secular Franciscan Order and was a devout Catholic active at St. Joseph the Worker in Bonneauville. She previously worshipped at St. Thomas Aquinas (California, Pa.) where she was administrative assistant and religious-education coordinator, and she has been lector, Eucharistic Minister and religious-education instructor at both parishes.

A teacher by trade, she spent most of her career at Brownsville Catholic School, previously teaching high-school biology at prestigious school districts like Fox Chapel (Pittsburgh) and Thomas Jefferson High School (Fairfax County, Va.). She was awarded the Good Egg Award by the Diocese of Greensburg for kindness and teaching excellence, and she loved combining her love of science with religious education. Before illness, she was an active walker, reader and collector of antiques. Her baking and cooking were legendary.

Mary Lou professed and became a Secular Franciscan on November 2, 1993.
