Minister's Message

The month of October has been dedicated to the holy rosary – a set of prayers said in honor of the Blessed Mother. Pope St. Pius V's Holy League won a major naval victory against the Ottoman Empire in the Battle of Lepanto on October 7, 1571. The Holy League was a coalition of Catholic states formed by Pope Pius V and Don John of Austria in response to the Ottoman Empire's threat to destroy Rome and enslave Christians in Europe.

Pope Pius V attributed the victory to the intercession of Our Lady of the Rosary, and to commemorate the victory he established the Feast of Our Lady of Victory. He also asked all Christians in Rome to pray the Rosary for victory.

CLIMATE CRISIS

Catholic Climate Covenant: Season of Creation 2024

"Developed nations", through the emission of greenhouse gases, are contributing to the warming of our planet. We are changing our climate in dynamic and dangerous ways. This climate crisis is destroying vast numbers of species and threatening life on our planet. We are experiencing more violent storms, wildfires, heatwaves, droughts and floods with damaging sea level rising causing human suffering especially to the poor and marginalized. Pope Francis in his 2021 encyclical Laudato Si highlighted the destructive force of "greed, exploitation, disrespect, disconnection and systemic degradation" of the richness of Creation by the process of development. Humans for centuries have ordered our lives and economies according to the logic of markets rather than the limits of the Earth.

Questions: As a Franciscan, how can I respond to the challenge of **Laudato Si**? How can we do this as a fraternity?

Chapter Two -The Way of Life

16. Let them esteem work both as a gift and as a sharing in the creation, redemption, and service of the human community.

Reflection- Another concrete means of proclaiming the Good News of Jesus Christ is expressed in attitudes toward work. Through working the Secular Franciscans discover their workaday world as the arena of their salvation and at the same time exemplify the saving Christ to others. So, human labor is a blessing, both received and bestowed. By working, a person shares in the creative power of the Father, renews the face of the earth along with the Son, and brings the love of the Holy Spirit to the human community. Such an attitude toward work can reshape one's own and others' values and actions regarding labor and management, business and economics, living wage and welfare, proper use of one's own talents and the resources of others.

Pope Innocent III, among other accomplishments, had the distinction of canonically recognizing the Franciscan Order, the Dominican Order, and the Waldensian Order. Never heard of the Waldensians? They were founded by Peter Waldo but went off the rails by failing to yield to local Bishops regarding preaching and other errors. They were declared heretic by Rome in 1184 and subsequently excommunicated. To this day the Franciscans and Dominicans may preach in all Diocese unless forbidden to do so by the local Ordinary.




Council Corner
