Spiritual Assistant's Message December 2024

Continuing and concluding our series on Francis's transformation of the church from Jon M. Sweeney's "How One Saint's Ancient Insights Are Transforming Today's Church", we look at the remaining of Francis's six ways.

CARE

This way, perhaps, summarizes Francis's gentleness not just to people and creatures, but to things, such as humankind, animals, sea life, plants, tree, and even rocks. He did this in order to be a follower of the Beatitudes. It was the gentleness and carefulness he had for little things that made him the saint for the environment we know today. In this respect, we see clearly how he was a man ahead of his time.


DEATH

Unlike most medieval people during his time who talked of life fatalistically as a "dance with death", Francis embraced death as an important part of living. His welcoming of death was unprecedented in Christian teaching and is more important than ever for all people of all backgrounds to struggle with. He called death his sister, as we all know as Franciscans. This also shows himself to be a man ahead of his time.

In all these six ways, Francis made a new path. These same areas of Christian life have been reestablished by the pontificate of Pope Francis. Francis of Assisi merited tens of thousands of followers quickly when he was doing these things 800 years ago. But he died an unhappy man, according to historians, because his closest companions abandoned his original ideals and the values he taught the people were slowly compromised. Being Christian in his six ways became no longer realistic. Even before his death in October of 1226, it was "back to the usual" in spite of the establishment of Franciscanism.

Today, we already know that Pope Francis is reviving the spirit of St. Francis. In his "Joy of the Gospel", the pontiff wrote, "Let us not allow ourselves to be robbed of the joy of the Gospel!" We must say "Amen" and then "How do we do it?" We look to the past not to just simply see what happened, but to understand not to do in the present. We need to continue to see what still needs to be done to perpetuate the transformation that started 800 years ago and is still happening today. We let Pope Francis lead us and let the Holy Spirit guide us as always and as inspired by our Seraphic Father Francis.

May you all have a blessed and joyous Christmas and a prosperous New Year!



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
Rule of the Secular Franciscan Order CHAPTER TWO: THE WAY OF LIFE


*"Besides restful waters he leads me." The Church Fathers saw this as a foreshadowing of the waters of baptism that calm us at the beginning of our new life with Jesus.

*"You spread the table before me, my cup overflows." This is recognized by the Church Fathers as the sacrament of the Eucharist. The body and blood of Jesus are "poured" out for forgiveness of sins, and overflowing (unlimited) mercy, one of the Beatitudes.

*"You anoint my head with oil."
The Church Fathers saw this as a reference to the sacramental oil used in baptism and confirmation, where we are anointed on the head.

I will fear no evil, for you are with me. In today's world, there is much evil still present, and it seems to be getting much worse in 2024 and beyond. Be bold and do what you can do; have faith that God will do what you cannot.

He makes me lie down in green pastures. He leads me beside the still waters. Living the Sermon on the Mount (the Beatitudes) is a great way to go from Gospel to Life and Life to Gospel. Peace be with you.
