Minister's Minute

Dear Brothers and Sisters, We hear a lot about WAITING during this Advent season. We all can relate to times of waiting, for a baby to be born, for diagnostic test results, for exam grades, on a shopping line, at a doctor's office, in traffic, etc. Today December 16 is the anniversary of my mother's death from pancreatic cancer in 1991. I had spent her final six weeks waiting with her for Jesus to come. It was a gift of time for love, for healing, for reconciliation, for caring and sharing and for prayer. The book by Henri Nouwen that spoke of waiting with hope, patience, expectant faith, surrender, etc., gave me consolation and strength along with the Eucharist, the Way of the Cross, the rosary and my family's encouragement. December 12: Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe



An interesting historical note from Bishop Robert Barron's Gospel Reflection on this feast day.

Though Franciscan missionaries had been laboring in Mexico for twenty years, they had made little progress. But within ten years of the appearance of Our Lady of Guadalupe practically the entire Mexican people, nine million strong, had converted to Christianity. Our Lady of Guadalupe had proved a more effective evangelist than Peter, Paul, St. Patrick, and St. Francis Xavier combined! And with that great national conversion, the Aztec practice of human sacrifice came to an end. She had done battle with fallen spirits and had won a culture-changing victory for the God of love.

APOSTLESHIP OF THE SEA CHRISTMAS SHOE BOX

In December, our fraternity has traditionally put together gift boxes for merchant seafarers who visit the Port of Baltimore. We did this because the seafarers put out to sea for long periods of time and are away from friends and family during this festive season.

There are 3 ways to help:

- 1) If you wish to fill a plastic shoe box, you can bring it to the Fraternity meeting on December 21. Please remember that there are also women Seafarers as well!! New guidelines require we fill a plastic shoe box which makes sense since a cardboard shoe box is no match for the rodents in the port area who can sniff out the beef jerky in the box. Stuff the plastic shoebox full of some of the items below, and wrap it with festive paper. See the list of suggested items below.
- 2) You could send a check to the Apostleship of the Sea at 320 Cathedral Street; Baltimore, MD 21202.
- 3) You can order items in bulk (like socks, warm hats, or gloves) and bring them to the Dec. 21st fraternity meeting. We'll deliver them to Dundalk with the gift boxes. Or if you order bulk items online, e.g. Amazon, you can have them shipped directly to Apostleship of the Sea, 6 Dunmanway, Dundalk, MD 21222.

Suggested contents:

Toothbrushes, toothpaste, dental floss, combs, nail clippers, mouthwash, shampoos, comb/brush, hand sanitizer, lip balm Hair conditioners, soap, shaving cream, deodorant, Q-tips, disposable razors

Socks, gloves, scarves, knit "watch caps" that cover the head and ears

Ball caps, pens, pencils, writing supplies, English dictionaries, 2024 calendars, pocket-sized address books/planners

Scotch tape, playing cards, travel sized games, reading materials (magazines, paperbacks)

Non-perishable foods/snacks/candy (no chocolate--it melts!) and a small Christmas card or blessing signed from a member, or members, of the Fraternity.
