January Reflection – Thank you, Donna!

Today's Catholic Church is challenged by a myriad of modern distractions. As a result, young people are turning away from their faith. Carlo Acutis was an exception to this trend. Beatified in 2020, this teenager has become a role model for young people seeking to live a faith-forward life. Holiness was not an abstract concept for him. He said, "To always be close to Jesus, that is my life plan."

Born in London in 1991, Carlo was a true millennial. His parents were not religious and it was Carlo who exemplified faith for his parents. As a young child he insisted on stopping to "say hello to Jesus" anytime he passed a church. It was this example that drew his parents back to the church.

Fascinated by computers, Carlo taught himself to use the internet as well as the basics of programming and graphic design. While he loved playing video games, he ultimately combined his passion for technology with his desire to please God. Nicknamed God's influencer, he used the internet to spread the message of God's love and mercy. He built websites dedicated to religious instruction and evangelization. His profound love for the Eucharist was evident in his most enduring legacy: a website dedicated to Eucharistic miracles from around the globe.

Ultimately Carlo was diagnosed with leukemia at the age of fifteen. The illness and subsequent treatments were difficult and caused him to suffer. Despite this, his faith remained unshaken. He offered his pain to God, for the church, and for the intentions of the pope.

Throughout his short life, and especially during his illness, Carlo lived his life radiating joy. He was aware of the suffering of others and responded with compassion. Using money from his weekly allowance, he attended to the needs of the homeless, needy, and immigrants. He explained, "Our lives will truly be beautiful if we discover how to love God above all things and our neighbor as ourselves."

Blessed Carlo is slated to be declared a saint in Assisi in 2025. He requested to be buried in Assisi due to his devotion to Saint Francis. Today he rests upon the very spot where tradition indicates that Saint Francis shed his clothing for a habit and renounced his wealth.

Throughout his short life, Blessed Carlo exhibited a holy wisdom far beyond his years. His life reflected his words — "To always be united with Christ: That is my life's program," As devout Franciscans, this should be our endeavor as well.
