From the Desk of Sr. Mary Therese

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

We are about to enter the first of two periods during the Liturgical Year which are called Ordinary Time. These periods do not have this name because there is nothing special going on, but because they are the "ordered" or "numbered" weeks. The Latin word ordinalis, which refers to numbers in a series, stems from the Latin word ordo, from which we get the English word order. So the numbered weeks of Ordinary Time represent the ordered life of the Church the period in which we live our lives neither in feasting (as in the Christmas and Easter seasons) or in penance (as in Advent and Lent), but in watchfulness and expectation of the Second Coming of Christ. The feast of the Baptism of the Lord ends the Christmas Season and begins Ordinary Time. Next is the Second Sunday of Ordinary Time and the Gospel always features either John the Baptist's acknowledgment of Christ as the Lamb of God or Christ's first miracle – the transformation of water into wine at the wedding at Cana. For Catholics, Ordinary Time is the part of the year in which Christ, the Lamb of God, walks among us and transforms our lives. There's nothing "ordinary" about that!

The first period of Ordinary Time is from the end of the Christmas Season until Ash Wednesday. This period is anywhere from 4 to 8 weeks. The second, longer period is from Pentecost until the First Sunday of Advent.

This year, the first period of Ordinary Time will be almost the full 8 weeks, so it is a good amount of time in which to pray about our discipleship and to listen for Christ's call at this time in our lives. What is his invitation to you this year? What does it mean when you hear Jesus say, "Come, follow Me"?



Prayer for Vocations


