The items for this newsletter deal with the submission of our region's Annual Report and payment of our Fair Share to the National Fraternity, along with a description of four formation events that were held.

The Annual Report is a requirement for all 30 regions in our National Fraternity. It looks back at the calendar year that just ended (2024), and it is a collection of responses received from the local fraternities. It covers changes in our membership population, along with a number of activity areas that the local and regional fraternities are responsible for to include, Spiritual Assistance, Formation, Justice Peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC), Multi-Cultural, Ecumenical/Interfaith, Youth and Young Adult, Fraternity Meetings, Newsletters, Technology, and Financial Management which is submitted separately by the region's Treasurer.

Our membership numbers as part of the Annual Report (displayed in the graph below) are used as the basis for what we pay to the National Fraternity for our Fair Share.




Figure 1: SMC Region's 2024 Membership Data



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These numbers haven't changed much since I provided this information at the Chapter of Mats in September of 2024 and at the Chapter of Ministers in November 2024. The Active Professed membership was 736 and constitutes most of the Fair Share Payment, which we made for 2024 on February 22, 2025, for \$17,732.00.

The region sponsored three formation events and co-sponsored a fourth with a local fraternity. On March 8, 2025, the region co-sponsored a Day of Reflection with St. Francis of Assisi Fraternity in Triangle, Virginia which was well attended with over 60 participants. The theme was friendship, and our presenter/facilitator was Father Russel Murray, OFM, one of our former Regional Spiritual Assistants. Both the content provided by Father Russel and the luncheon served as part of the event were well received by all.



Additionally, on March 29, 2025, the region held its Annual Day of Reflection at the Franciscan Monastery in Washington, D.C. for all Candidates which was also open to Professed wanting to attend. Our presenter/facilitator for this event was Brother Mike Meza, Cap., who is also one of our Regional Spiritual Assistants.

Finally, we held two formation workshops for local fraternity councils, one on May 3, 2025, at the Church of the Incarnation in Charlottesville, Virginia and on May 24, 2025, at the Shrine of St. Anthony in Ellicott City, Maryland. These were the same workshops entitled, Embracing Your Leadership Journey, held in separate geographic locations in our region (one in the south and the other in the north) to facilitate attendance for those closest to those locations. The workshops were given by

the region's Formation Director, Rita Colleran, Vice Minister, Michael Oliver, and me. The morning sessions were based on the concepts of servant leadership, organizational culture, and change, while the afternoon sessions were more practical application on fraternity culture, councils working together with their fraternity, animating and guiding, and shepherding. Combined, there were over 60 attendees who participated and shared their ideas and concerns with each other at these events.

All four of these one-day events were part of the region's attempt to localize the formation experience by hosting them in different parts of the region to ease travel time and reduce costs for attendees. For those who prefer the more traditional weekend experience, the next regional event will be a formation weekend on June 27-29, 2025, at Priestfield Pastoral Center in Kearneysville, West Virginia which is open to all. JPIC Reflections - A Call to Interrupt Our Journey

Life is made up of encounters, and in these encounters, we emerge for what we are. We find ourselves in front of others, faced with their fragility and weakness, and we can decide what to do: to take care of them or pretend nothing is wrong.

Pope Leo XIV used these words in describing the story of the Good Samaritan in his May 28 general audience.

Reminding us that a priest and a Levite go down the same road as the Samaritan, he continues. "We can imagine that, after staying a long time in Jerusalem, that priest and that Levite are in a hurry to return home. It is indeed haste, so present in our lives, that very often prevents us from feeling compassion. Those who think that their own journey must take precedence are not willing to stop for another. But here comes someone who is actually able to stop: he is a Samaritan. . . This Samaritan simply stops because he is a man faced with another man in need of help. . . because if you want to help someone, you cannot think of keeping your distance, you have to get involved, get dirty, perhaps be contaminated; he binds the wounds after cleaning them with oil and wine; he loads him onto his horse, taking on the burden, because one who truly helps is willing to feel the weight of the other's pain."

Our Holy Father directs the question then to each of us: "When will we too be capable of interrupting our journey and having compassion? When we understand that the wounded man in the street represents each one of us. And then the memory of all the times that Jesus stopped to take care of us will make us more capable of compassion."

Living as professed members of a religious order in the world, haste is a regular occurrence. Obligations of all types challenge us daily to be "too busy." As Secular Franciscans, it seems to be a part of our vocation that we "interrupt our journey." It is how we are called to be, how we live as professed members of a religious order in the world.

Pope Leo XIV's observations on the Good Samaritan, in a sense his call for us to help our neighbors in need, is no surprise. As he acknowledged himself, his name was a nod to Pope Leo XIII who wrote the encyclical Rerum Novarum. Pope Leo XIII's words from that 1891 encyclical, written about conflict, are as meaningful today as they were then:

The elements of the conflict now raging are unmistakable, in the vast expansion of industrial pursuits and the marvelous discoveries of science... in the enormous fortunes of some few individuals, and the utter poverty of the masses... also, finally, in the prevailing moral degeneracy.

Long considered an important instruction on Catholic Social Teaching, the Holy See continues to develop her great tradition. In our own lifetime, encyclicals following the themes of Catholic Social Teaching include the following:

Pope John Paul II's encyclicals including Laborem Exercens (On Human Work, 1981); Solicitudo Rei Socialis (On Social Concern, 1987); Evangelium Vitae (The Gospel of Life, 1995); and Centesimus Annus (100 year anniversary of Rerum Novarum, 1991).

From Pope Benedict XVI, encyclicals including Deus Caritas Est (God Is Love, 2005) and Caritas in Veritate (Charity in Truth, 2009).

Pope Francis's encyclicals including Evangelii Gaudium (Joy of the Gospel, 2013) and of course Laudato Si: On Care for Our Common Home (2015).

Pope John Paul II's Centesimus Annus is a celebration of the 100th anniversary of Pope Leo XIII's Rerum Novarum. Pope John Paul II writes:

Today more than ever, the Church is aware that her social message will gain credibility more immediately from the witness of actions than as a result of its internal logic and consistency. This awareness is also a source of her preferential option for the poor, which is never exclusive or discriminatory towards other groups. This option is not limited to material poverty, since it is well known that there are many other forms of poverty, especially in modern society - not only economic but cultural and spiritual poverty as well.

The Church's love for the poor, which is essential for her and a part of her constant tradition, impels her to give attention to a world in which poverty is threatening to assume massive proportions in spite of technological and economic progress. In the countries of the West, different forms of poverty are being experienced by groups which live on the margins of society, by the elderly and the sick, by the victims of consumerism, and even more immediately by so many refugees and migrants. In the developing countries, tragic crises loom on the horizon unless internationally coordinated measures are taken before it is too late.

Written 34 years ago, these words of Saint Pope John Paul II can help us immensely.

It seems like a safe bet that our new Holy Father will focus on these same ongoing themes of the poor and marginalized. And hopefully as our Order grows in its fraternities and individual members, we will be blessed to find new and creative ways to be interrupted on our journey. Towards this end, as always, it is good for us to return to our Rule:

Called like Saint Francis to rebuild the Church and inspired by his example, let them devote themselves energetically to living in full communion with the pope, bishops, and priests, fostering an open and trusting dialog of apostolic effectiveness and creativity. Rule 6

Like the Good Samaritan, with the grace of God may we always make the best choices. And with the intercession of our Seraphic Father Francis, our Holy Mother Clare, and Mary our Mother Queen of the Seraphic Order, may we be inspired to be faithful to the words of our new Holy Father Leo XIV:

Life is made up of encounters, and in these encounters, we emerge for what we are. We find ourselves in front of others, faced with their fragility and weakness, and we can decide what to do: to take care of them or pretend nothing is wrong. (General Audience, May 28, 2025)

Secular Franciscans: Be the Bridge you are meant to be

Fr. Charley Miller has presented much information to us over the past few years to inspire our Franciscan journey as we attended days of refection with him. One of the themes which particularly struck me was that of the term," Secular Franciscan," a paradoxical term at best. How are we to bridge that divide between being secular and being Franciscan? How do we create a path between the realities of our world and the spiritual life of our father St. Francis?

Pete Seeger wrote a song many years ago. Most of us have probably heard it for it is played even today. It is called, "Turn! Turn! Turn!" (To everything there is a season and a time to every purpose under heaven ") I can't help but think about these words today when I consider the world around me. Some of the words are consoling, some discouraging, but always, the words seem true to every generation- "....a time to live, to die, to plant, to reap, to build up, to break down, to dance, to mourn, to gather stones, to cast away stones, to love. And in the midst of all, we see times of hate, war, peace, times to embrace, times to refrain from embracing, times to gain, times to lose, times to rend, times to sow, times for peace, and when speaking of peace he wrote those famous words-<u>I swear it's not too late</u>."

The song flowed from the Biblical verse in the book of Ecclesiastes, reminding us all of the fleeting nature of the world and of our lives.. So what is it that we as Franciscans are to build up, break down, cast away, gather, embrace...so as to bring the Lord to our world and bridge that abyss between the seculars and the Franciscans? What are we to inspire? What do we live out our mission of bringing the Gospel to life among the people we live among, those we meet each day, those we will never meet face to face? Do we embrace, plant, dance, gather...as we could?

Pope Francis left us with a tremendous gift when he dedicated this Jubilee year to Hope. There is so much to be hopeful for and hopeful about, even today. Our new church leader, Pope Leo XIV already inspires us with his own words about hope, peace, humility, dignity of life, and so much more.

None of us know how much time we have left to fulfill our personal commitment of spreading Christ's love to the world. No matter what we have done to this point, let us "begin again," or perhaps rededicate ourselves with Pope Leo, to fulfill the responsibilities of our vocation, to bridge the gap between what is secular and what is Franciscan in us, never losing the hope of Christ - That hope which never ends, the hope of everlasting life for each and all. For as in Mr. Seeger's words, "it is never too late" to bring Christ to the world.

Interfaith Dialogue in the Contemporary World

Hello to all my Franciscan sisters and brothers!

This is an article based on a blog from the Dialogue Institute and Journal of Ecumenical Studies and authored by 2023 alumni Danyar M. Ali, entitled, "The Significance of Interfaith Dialogue in the Contemporary World." It elaborates on the most important means of communication in our societies of the world today.

It is rapidly imperative in today's world that amidst the religious and cultural diversity characterizing our society, interfaith dialogue should be more and more appreciated. This dialogue will not only help people understand each other, but it can also be a very important tool in building bridges and peaceful coexistence among our communities. Interfaith dialogue can play a fundamental role in reducing conflicts and tensions, countering extremism and opening up tolerance in our societies. Another significant result of interfaith dialogue is that it can lead to the complete elimination of biases and misunderstandings among the adherents of various standards. These come from a lack of knowledge and gaps in personal contact with other people. Very often, this disunity can be resolved by representatives of the various standards sitting down together to discuss the problems between them honestly and openly. This usually diminishes suspicion and fear of one another, building even more trust among the different religious groups.

Interfaith dialogue leads to increased tolerance and respect for society. As people learn to listen and understand the different perspectives, they will know to contribute toward the development of respect for differences and to a more open and diverse society. Such dialogue also makes one introspect his belief system but yet be open to the thoughts of another. This eventually leads to a society that is resourceful and vibrant where the differences become a form of blessing rather than a source of intimidation.

Interfaith dialogue can also serve as a significant factor in settling social and political issues. Often, religious beliefs are involved with problems of global complexity. Interreligious dialogue will form a channel for religious leaders and their followers to find peaceful solutions through their collaborative cooperation. This cooperation can also lead to specific areas such as the fight against poverty, climate change, and inequality. To this effect, when different religions engage in a common cause as a service to a community, this serves a dual purpose: solving a common problem and reinforcing their relationships.

This is an invitation to reflect on Chapter 2 – THE WAY OF LIFE of Rule for the Secular Franciscan Order. This is an exercise that is divided into four parts:

Part One – Articles 4-7 Part Two Articles 8-11 Part Three Articles 12-15 Part Four Articles 16-19

This is not a re-invention of the Rule, Chapter Two. It is a way to facilitate the study and discussion of the Rule's Way of Life as given to us by St. Francis and approved by Pope Paul VI. As Franciscans, a re-visit and re-read of the Rule can only benefit our understanding of our call and vocation as Secular Franciscans.

This can be used for ongoing formation in your local fraternities or as a home study guide. Below are some ideas to consider as you develop your own exercise to fit your individual Fraternity.

- Make a special prayer space with candles where you will have little to no distractions.
- Handouts can be made for the section/sections you will be studying. Extra blank sheets for notes are helpful.
- Small groups can do this exercise in a circle or at a table. Larger groups can be divided into separate circles or tables.
- Center yourself and your group and invoke the Holy Spirit with a special prayer.
- The leader or volunteer should read each Article slowly and prayerfully.
- Pause for reflection.
- Emphasizing the 2022-2023 National Secular Franciscan Fraternity Theme of "Listen, Discern and Go Forth", ask
 members to think about listening, discerning and going forth as it relates to the Article. This is an appropriate time
 for discussion either in one group or smaller groups. Leader or volunteer may prompt members to write down
 either one word or a short phrase that comes to them for each Article in the box provided or on a separate sheet of
 paper.
- Remember to take your time. THIS IS VERY IMPORTANT: TAKE THE <u>TIME</u> TO PROCESS THOUGHTS AND ALLOW DETAILED DISCUSSION EVEN IF YOU ONLY COMPLETE ONE ARTICLE. You know your Fraternity best, so tailor this exercise for the benefit of all sisters and brothers.

PART ONE - ARTICLES 4 - 7

- 4. The rule and life of the Secular Franciscans is this: to observe the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ by following the example of Saint Francis of Assisi, who made Christ the inspiration and the center of his life with God and people. Christ, the gift of the Father's love, is the way to him, the truth into which the Holy Spirit leads us, and the life which he has come to give abundantly. Secular Franciscans should devote themselves especially to careful reading of the gospel, going from gospel to life and life to the gospel.
- 5. Secular Franciscans, therefore, should seek to encounter the living and active person of Christ in their brothers and sisters, in Sacred Scripture, in the Church, and in liturgical activity. The faith of Saint Francis, who often said, "I see nothing bodily of the Most High Son of God in this world except his most holy body and blood", should be the inspiration and pattern of their Eucharistic life.
- 6. They have been made living members of the Church by being buried and raised with Christ in baptism; they have been united more intimately with the Church by profession. Therefore, they should go forth as witnesses and instruments of her mission among all people, proclaiming Christ by their life and words. Called like Saint Francis to rebuild the Church and inspired by his example, let them devote themselves energetically to living in full communion with the pope, bishops, and priests, fostering an open and trusting dialogue of apostolic effectiveness and creativity.
- 7. United by their vocation as "brothers and sisters of penance", and motivated by the dynamic power of the gospel, let them conform their thoughts and deeds to those of Christ by means of that radical interior change which the gospel itself calls "conversion". Human frailty makes it necessary that this conversion be carried out daily. On this road to renewal the sacrament of Reconciliation is the privileged sign of the Father's mercy and the source of grace.

PART TWO - ARTICLES 8 - 11

8. As Jesus was the true worshipper of the Father, so let prayer and contemplation be the soul of all they are and do. Let them participate in the sacramental life of the Church, above all the Eucharist. Let them join in liturgical prayer in one of the forms proposed by the Church, reliving the mysteries of the life of Christ.

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- **9.** The Virgin Mary, humble servant of the Lord, was open to his every word and call. She was embraced by Francis with indescribable love and declared the protectress and advocate of his family. The Secular Franciscans should express their ardent love for her by imitating her complete self-giving and by praying earnestly and confidently.
- **10.** Uniting themselves to the redemptive obedience of Jesus, who placed his will into the Father's hands, let them faithfully fulfil the duties proper to their various circumstances of life. Let them also follow the poor and crucified Christ, witness to him even in difficulties and persecutions.
- 11. Trusting in the Father, Christ chose for himself and his mother a poor and humble life, even though he valued created things attentively and lovingly. Let the Secular Franciscans seek a proper spirit of detachment from temporal goods by simplifying their own material needs. Let them be mindful that according to the gospel, they are stewards of the goods received for the benefit of God's children. Thus, in the spirit of "the Beatitudes" and as pilgrims and strangers on their way to the home of the Father, they should strive to purify their hearts from every tendency and yearning for possession and power.

PART THREE ARTICLES 12 - 15

- **12.** Witnessing to the good yet to come and obliged to acquire purity of heart because of the vocation they have embraced, they should set themselves free to love God and their brothers and sisters.
- **13.** As the Father sees in every person the features of his Son, the firstborn of many brothers and sisters, so the Secular Franciscans with a gentle and courteous spirit accept all people as a gift of the Lord and an image of Christ. A sense of community will make them joyful and ready to place themselves on an equal basis with all people, especially with the lowly for whom they shall strive to create conditions of life worthy of people redeemed by Christ.
- 14. Secular Franciscans, together with all people of good will, are called to build a more fraternal and evangelical world so that the kingdom of God may be brought about more effectively. Mindful that anyone "who follows Christ, the perfect man, becomes more of a man himself", let them exercise their responsibilities competently in Christian spirit of service.

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15. Let them individually and collectively be in the forefront in promoting Justice by the testimony of their human lives and their courageous initiatives. Especially in the field of public life, they should make definite choices in harmony with their faith.

PART FOUR - ARTICLES 16 - 19

- **16.** Let them esteem work both as a gift and as a sharing in the creation, redemption, and service of the human community.
- 17. In their family they should cultivate the Franciscan spirit of peace, fidelity, and respect for life, striving to make of it a sign of a world already renewed in Christ. By living the grace of matrimony, husbands and wives in particular should bear witness in the world to the love of Christ for his Church. They should joyfully accompany their children on their human and spiritual journey by providing a simple and open Christian education and being attentive to the vocation of each child.
- 18. Moreover they should respect all creatures, animate and inanimate, which "bear the imprint of the Most High", and they should strive to move from the temptation of exploiting creation to the Franciscan concept of universal kinship.
- **19.** Mindful that they are bearers of peace which must be built up unceasingly, they should seek out ways of unity and fraternal harmony through dialogue, trusting in the presence of the divine seed in everyone and in the transforming power of love and pardon. Messengers of perfect joy in every circumstance, they should strive to bring joy and hope to others. Since they are immersed in the resurrection of Christ, which gives true meaning to Sister Death, let them serenely tend toward the ultimate encounter with the Father.
