Minister's Notes

I have to admit to a guilty pleasure: I enjoy watching "Ancient Aliens." Their theories require more than a grain of salt, but they go to some fascinating places that I will never see except on the TV screen. Sometimes their theories about "extraterrestrial gods" and the amazing ancient architecture and knowledge they discuss make me reflect on how everything really is a gift from Our Lord, who has given humans the powers of creativity, learning, and stewardship of His gifts.

One recent episode in particular started a train of reflection. In a discussion of good and evil forces, they talked with a Japanese scientist who has been doing experiments on water. His lab team has been applying positive and negative forces to vials of water in various ways, sometimes via kind or vicious words directed at the container, classical/soothing or dissonant music, happy or negative thoughts projected at the water. Then they flash freeze the water and examine its crystalline structure. According to the scientist, the water displays different properties, depending on whether it was subjected to positive or negative forces. The positively treated water formed perfect, lovely crystals; in contrast, the water subjected to negativity produced deformed, ugly crystals.

This made me think of St Francis and the "Canticle of the Creatures." (See p. 5.) We celebrate St Francis' feast this month, and we mark the 800th anniversary of the canticle. In that great song of praise, Francis called on all creation to join in praising Our Lord, and he thanked them, and the Lord, for the service they provide. Thus, here is an instance of

treating various things with respect and/or kindness.

I don't mean that Francis ascribed animistic characters to the things around him. He did, however, preach that we should value everything – humans and both animate and inanimate beings – as part of God's creation and gift, reflecting on God himself in them. Genesis tells us that God gave us all things for our use and enjoined humans to be stewards of them all. Francis combined his wonder at the Lord's love and the beauty of creation into the "Canticle of the Creatures." I think the studies I mentioned above would only have confirmed and strengthened his exhortation to treat all things with respect and dignity.

As we all know, Francis practiced what he preached. He called on the birds to join him in singing God's praise, and he worked with the villagers and the wolf of Gubbio to get both sides to be respectful of the other. He is also reputed to have asked Brother Fire to be kind to him when they cauterized his eye.

In the modern JPIC prong of our charism, we acknowledge Francis as the patron saint of the environment in the "integrity of creation" part of "justice, peace, and integrity of creation." We have an environmental lawyer in our fraternity who can speak to us about some of the ways in which humans are destroying God's natural wonders; let's think about asking Anne to talk to us about her work and how we can help. Whatever we decide on that score, let us take time to look around us, to see the beauty of God's work, and to reflect on His love and generosity in sharing it all with us.

I do want to highlight the General Constitutions feature below. As Mike leads us through our study of the OFS Rule, I will continue to include the articles from the General Constitutions that help enflesh our Rule of Life. Articles 1-7 of the General Constitutions pertain to articles 1-3 of the OFS Rule. (Cont. p. 6.)

General Constitutions

Sections Applying Directly to Chapter 2 of the Rule

Article 8

- 1. Secular Franciscans commit themselves by their profession to live the Gospel according to Franciscan spirituality in their secular condition.
- 2. They seek to deepen, in the light of faith, the values and choices of the evangelical life according to the Rule of the OFS: - Rule 7. in a continually renewed journey of conversion and of formation; Rule 4. open to the challenges that come from society and from the Church's life situation, "going from Gospel to life and from life to Gospel"; in the personal and communal dimensions of this journey. (Cont. p. 4.)

Article 9

- 1. *Rule 5*. The spirituality of the Secular Franciscan is a plan of life centered on the person and on the following of Christ⁹, rather than a detailed program to be put into practice.
- 2. *Rule 4*. The Secular Franciscan, committed to following the example and the teachings of Christ, must personally and assiduously study the Gospel

and Sacred Scripture. The fraternity and those responsible for it should foster love for the word of the Gospel and help the brothers and sisters to know and understand it as it is proclaimed by the Church with the assistance of the Spirit.¹⁰

Money

"I strictly forbid the brothers to receive money in any form either directly or through an intermediary" (St. Francis, Later Rule, 4).

St. Francis did not want to touch money. We usually describe him as wanting to be materially poor, but he had a deeper reason to shun coins. There were two systems of coinage in his day, as the economy was changing, and poorer people had reason to use currency again. The economy in Western Europe had become largely based on farming estates, but as merchants and artisans became more common, a common currency rose in use: the pecunia piccola, lower value coins used by those who were not noble or wealthy. This coinage was subject to periodic devaluation.

This contrasted with the pecunia grossa, which was spared the devaluation, but was a higher value coinage that poorer people could not afford. The friars, then, were refusing to participate in an unjust economic tool, coins, which were manipulated to restrict economic freedom of those who did not already have a high value portfolio of land or wealth. Poverty was certainly a consequence of this decision.

Personally, I wonder whether cryptocurrency like bitcoin is simply another way for those with large sums of currency to get out from under the regulation of the governmental currencies that everyone uses equally.

The Canticle of the Creatures

By St. Francis of Assisi

Most High, all-powerful, good Lord
Yours are the praises, the glory, and the honor, and all blessing,
To you alone, Most High, do they belong,
and no human is worthy to mention your name.

Praised be You, my Lord, with all Your creatures, especially Sir Brother Sun
Who is the day and through whom You give us light. and he is beautiful and radiant with great splendor; and bears a likeness of You, Most High One.

Praised be You, my Lord, through Sister Moon and the stars, in heaven You formed them clear and precious and beautiful.

Praised be to You, my Lord, through Brother Wind, and through the air, cloudy and serene, and every kind of weather, through whom You give sustenance to Your creatures.

Praised be to You, my Lord, through Sister Water, who is very useful and humble and precious and chaste.

Praised be You, my Lord, through Brother Fire, through whom You light the night, and he is beautiful and playful and robust and strong.

Praised be You, my Lord, through our Sister Mother Earth, who sustains and governs us, and who produces various fruit with colored flowers and herbs.

Praised be You, my Lord, through those who give pardon for Your love, and bear infirmity and tribulation.

Blessed are those who endure in peace for by You, Most High, shall they be crowned.

Praised be You, my Lord, through our Sister Bodily Death, from whom no one living can escape.

Woe to those who die in mortal sin.

Blessed are those whom death will find in Your most holy will, for the second death shall do them no harm.

Praise and bless my Lord and give Him thanks and serve Him with great humility.

Secretary's Notes (Continued)

The Secular Franciscan Order. Articles 8-27 relate to articles 4-19 of the OFS Rule, The Way of Life. The articles of the General Constitutions relate directly to our day-to-day life as Secular Franciscans. Finally, articles 28-103 pertain to articles 20-25 of the OFS Rule, Life in Fraternity. Most of these latter articles cover things like the duties of fraternity servant leaders, elections, visitations, etc.

A thought related to *The Canticles of the Creatures* came from a talk given by Fr. Steven King, OFM, Conv. He drew the connection between the medieval understanding of the nature of created things and *The Canticle*. To someone living in Francis' time, everything that exists consisted in various degrees of wind, water, fire and earth much as the colors you see on a computer screen consist of various combinations of blue, yellow and red dots. St. Francis praising the components that make up all creation is celebrating all of creation.

Daniel P. Horan offers further insights into interpreting the Canticle. He writes,

... it's important to recall that Francis was seriously ill at the time he wrote this beautiful text. Contemporaneous sources and medieval hagiographies alike tell us that Francis suffered from a terrible eye infection, which caused him to be in incredible pain and nearly blind in the last years of his life. It is within this context that he proclaims: "Praise be You, my Lord, with all Your creatures, especially Sir Brother Sun, Who is the day and through whom you give us light. And he is beautiful and radiant with great splendor; and bears a likeness of You, Most High One."

The fact that exposure to sunlight almost certainly pained Francis raises a question for contemplation: What allowed him to recognize and celebrate the inherent goodness of creation, his interdependence with it and its intrinsic relationship with the Creator with such joy amid suffering?

The late British theologian Franciscan Fr. Eric Doyle wrote, "All beautiful words and music come from the mystery of personhood, welling up from the inner depths. It is therefore not so remarkable that Francis, though blind, was able to write a song about the beauty and unity of creation."

It wasn't necessarily about seeing the visual beauty of creation, but about recognizing the intrinsic goodness of God's community of which he was (and we are) already a part. Reflecting further, Doyle adds:

He was already one with himself and with the world, and the world was one in him. By the unity which he experienced, Francis found himself endowed with the sixth sense of heartsight, or what he himself once described as "the eyes of the spirit." ... The sun, the moon and the stars, the wind and the earth, the fire and the water were within him. And by the light of the inner sun, he saw the loveliness of everything.

This sense of unity and interdependence led Francis to call each element of the created world — sentient or otherwise — his "brother," "sister" and "mother." He understood in an intuitive, mystical way the truth of creaturely kinship. He did not see himself as a steward or landlord of nonhuman creation, but rather as a family member who cared for his siblings as they too cared for him...

Pope Leo XIV - Jubilee Audience - October 4, 2025

Catechesis, 6. To Hope is to Choose, Clare of Assisi

Summary of Catechesis:

Dear brothers and sisters, as we continue our Jubilee catecheses we reflect on the choice to hope. We heard in the Gospel passage today about the choice to serve God or to serve money. When we allow material possessions to rule over us, we can fall into spiritual sadness. When we choose God, however, we choose hope and a life of forgivenss and mercy. On this feast day of Saint Francis of Assisi, we look at his life and that of Saint Clare. They are models of those who understood the Gospel and chose a life of poverty as Jesus did. Their choice continues to inspire many to remember that the earth belongs to everyone. Let us pray to be a Church that serves God and the poor and opens the door of hope to the world.
