

At the conclusion of the procession, a bi-lingual Mass was held at the school with members of St. Camillus Parish and the participants.







Interfaith Dialogue In The Contemporary World Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to all!

This is the third and final part of my article on the blog, "The Significance of Interfaith Dialogue in the Contemporary World" by Dialogue Institute alumnus Danyar M. Ali and published in the Journal of Ecumenical Studies.

Interfaith dialogue emphasizes our common features as humans. Regardless of our many religious differences, we are all ultimately human and share the same basic needs and aspirations. Real dialogue allows us to understand this human commonality and develop much better relations based on it. When we share something in common, whether good or bad, it can become a platform on which to cooperate with each other and thus come together against the challenges that face all of humanity, and continue to do so, such as disease, poverty, and climate change.

How about world peace? Interfaith dialogue can be important even here in maintaining it. In a world where conflicts and wars are often the result of religious factors, interfaith dialogue can become an important tool for conflict and peaceful solutions. When religious leaders learn to sit together and discuss, it hopefully becomes an example for decision-makers and politicians on how to peacefully resolve differences. As Franciscans, the Sultan and the Saint come to mind here.


But interfaith dialogue is not easy to come by: it has its own barriers. Deep differences in traditions and beliefs, a history of hostility and conflict, the fear of a loss of unique identity, are all deterrents to effective dialogue. Some fear that dialogue may make their convictions weak or even force them to compromise basic religious principles. It is thus of the essence to conduct interfaith dialogue in a sensitive way regarding the differences of others with respect and try to achieve commonalities without convincing others about beliefs contrary to oneself. To assure this, the dialogue should not involve just religious heads, but people at the grassroots level where sensitization and education is needed.

Interfaith dialogue, in spite of all the obstacles here, is still one of the most important tools which can be used to establish a more united and peaceful world. By it, we can understand how to best respect differences and respect commonality. We can together solve many of the problems that all human beings face. Together, we can foster a society that recognizes diversity in religion and cultures can be an asset, not a source of division.

Our communities, our states, and our personal selves should take every possible measure to encourage and support interfaith dialogue: as Franciscans, we all should. It is necessary that the values of tolerance and respect for differences that we find in our Franciscan values be emphasized, taught, and spread through the media and our educational systems. In this respect, peace and coexistence will be in first place.

Interfaith dialogue is not only a religious issue, but a human one, and one that concerns the fate of all of us. It's the way to closer cooperation and greater understanding. We all must join in on this process for the good of our future.

A reflection on Mary at the time of the Incarnation, inspired by the song "Candlelight Carol"

Max Lucado writes: "Wide awake is Mary. How young She is! Her head rests on the soft leather of Joseph's saddle. She looks into the face of the baby, Her son, Her Lord, His Majesty. At this point in history, the human being who best understands who God is and what He is doing is a teenage girl in a smelly stable. It was the first time in the history of this world that anyone could ever think of heaven as being anywhere else than "somewhere up there." When Jesus was in Her arms, Mary looked down to Heaven." She can't take Her eyes off Him.

She and Joseph kneel and adore Him. They know He is God...this is He who was prophesied through the ages. Mary remembers the words of the angel, "His kingdom will never end." She touches the face of the infant-God, thinking of the recent events of this special day...

Bethlehem was so crowded. What, with all the commotion about the census, there were many people in town, and lots of noise, hassle and fuss. The very sight of a woman ready to give birth was enough to make the innkeepers say there was no room, and so Mary and Joseph were passed over...again and again. Sadly, there were no hearts in Bethlehem ready for the coming of the Son of David that day.

The serenity of Mary on the day of Jesus' birth is something we should not easily forget. Mary's silent trust in God the Father to take good care of His Son was total, so when the only place left in Bethlehem was a stable, Mary accepted...

Mary knew how special Jesus was. His greatness was even proclaimed from the heavens, where He was and is eternally recognized, loved, and glorified. The angelic choir began the Christmas celebration with the Gloria: "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and peace to God's people on earth."

For Francis, the Incarnation was the basis of his spiritual life. He went out of his way to follow in every way the example of the "Word made flesh." Therefore, it would seem natural that he had a special love for Mary, who brought God within our reach and "made the Lord of Majesty a brother to us. Thomas Celano wrote that Francis "embraced the Mother of Jesus with inexpressible love. He honored Her with his own praises (Salutation of the Blessed Virgin Mary), poured out prayers to Her, and offered Her his love in a way that no human tongue could express." Further, he gave the Franciscan order its greatest joy when he appointed Her the advocate of the order. In that joy, he placed under Her wings the sons he would leave behind, that She might protect and cherish them to the end of time.

Pope St. John Paul II, whose love and devotion to Mary was well known to many, wrote that "Advent is the Marian season par excellence, because Mary is the woman who awaited and welcomed the Son of God made man in an exemplary way." She is the one who was the first to open the doors of Her heart to Christ, and who shows us the way to do the same. She teaches us how to be humble, and reminds us that God looks upon the lowly. She enables us to understand the value of prayer, of inner silence, of listening to God's Word. As our Advocate and Mediatrix of graces, She spurs us to see God's will deeply and sincerely, even when this upsets our plans. She encourages us while we wait for the Lord, showing us how to share our time and energies with those in need. She, the Mother of God, the Virgin of expectation, intercedes with God the Father to obtain an abundance of mercy for His people at all times...She never abandons them.

And so let us pray with Mary as She looks upon Her Son on the day of His birth, remembering that the Key to understanding Mary is Jesus.

"Sleep well dear Jesus...

Enjoy the silence of the crib, for the noise of confusion will rumble in Your future. Savor the sweet safety of My arms and the loving tenderness reflected in My eyes, so that You carry it with You all Your days, for a day is coming when I will not be able to protect You.

Rest well, tiny hands, for though You belong to a king, You will touch no satin and own no gold. Your hands are reserved for works more precious...to touch a leper's open wound, to wipe a widow's weary tear, to claw the ground of Gethsemane.. Sleep deeply, tiny eyes. Sleep while you can. For soon blurriness will clear and you will see what man has done to Your world.

Lie still, tiny mouth from which eternity will speak, for You will soon silence man's foolishness and define grace, mercy, and forgiveness.

Be still, tiny tongue that will call us to You...

JUSTICE, PEACE, AND INTEGRITY OF CREATION

Entering the Year of JPIC

2026 will be the year to focus our St. Margaret of Cortona Region's efforts on our JPIC charism. Listening to the representative Secular Franciscans who attended the Summer 2024 Chapter of Mats, this JPIC focus is in response to the feedback from this gathering. The Chapter's planning process was thorough and intense, considering input from a large cross-section of participants. Defining what Secular Franciscans want both for their Fraternities and from the Region, the process resulted in naming four major themes:

- Engage and Encourage
- Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation (JPIC)
- Technology
- Multi-Generational / Multi-Cultural

Specific ideas expressed in each of these categories have been cited often by Regional Minister Gary Burton, OFS, and Vice Minister Michael Oliver, OFS. During 2025, the focus was on "Engage and Encourage." And for 2026. . . Thanks to your feedback, the Region's focus is on Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation (JPIC). That is no surprise, perhaps, given how central the JPIC mission is to our Order's charism.

It would be helpful for us to look closely at the JPIC Mission for guidance.

The mission of JPIC is to assist the Professed Secular Franciscans as they reflect on their relationship with God as manifested in the fruits of conversion in their lives. This with special regard to the daily choices made in the areas of justice, peacemaking and respect for all created things and people; as brothers and sisters of penance, bringing Life to the Gospel and the Gospel to Life.

Repeating a particularly key phrase:

This with special regard to the daily choices made. . .

This broad definition of JPIC is important for our understanding of it. Some Fraternities mistakenly use JPIC to refer only to a Fraternity's charitable and advocacy work. While these individual and group apostolates are an integral part of the way we express our charism, JPIC is much more than the volunteer work we do once a month. For Secular Franciscans, it involves the "daily choices made" across all aspects of our lives – in Fraternity, at work, in our families, in our local communities, and even in our global perspective. In all of these ways, we are called upon again and again to make decisions that are just, inspire peacemaking, and demonstrate respect for all created things and people.

Rooted in Catholic Social Teaching, like our Order, the Church calls us to specific actions. For instance, as expressed in our Holy Father's first apostolic exhortation, we are called to "love the poor." Speaking in a special way to Franciscans, it is not a coincidence that it was signed on October 4 and references the "Poor Man of Assisi," In quoting Dilexi te:

Eight centuries ago, Saint Francis prompted an evangelical renewal in the Christians and society of his time. Wealthy and self-confident, the young Francis was taken aback and converted by his direct contact with the poor and outcast of society. The story of his life continues to appeal to the minds and hearts of believers, and many non-believers as well. It "changed history." A further step on the same path was taken by the Second Vatican Council, as Saint Paul VI pointed out when he said that "the ancient parable of the Samaritan served as the model for the Council's spirituality." I am convinced that the preferential choice for the poor is a source of extraordinary renewal both for the Church and for society, if we can only set ourselves free of our self-centeredness and open our ears to their cry.

So much of this is consistent with our own Rule. Not just in the Church's call to love the poor, but across the entirety of the JPIC Mission. Perhaps the reason that JPIC is so often said to be the very heart of our charism. . . is because of the way its Mission Statement simply encapsulates a large portion of the Secular Franciscan Rule.

Another explicit instruction rooted in Catholic teaching, Pope Leo XIV recently addressed the United Nations climate talks, suggesting "urgent actions" for countries to stop climate change and its danger to the planet. Care for our planet is an ongoing concern for the Holy Father. In September, he asked "what must be done now to ensure that caring for our common home and listening to the cry of the earth and the poor do not appear as mere passing trends or, worse still, are seen and felt as divisive issues?" He called for us to experience a "true ecological conversion. . . from collecting data to caring, and from environmental discourse to an ecological conversion that transforms both personal and communal lifestyles."

All of these elements are rooted in Catholic Social Teaching, consistent with our Rule. Again, another example. . . and reason to stay informed of Church teaching that impacts the daily choices we make as Secular Franciscans.

So continuing on the path our Sisters and Brothers laid out for the Region last year at the Chapter of Mats. . . In 2026, the Region will support Fraternities with:

- the further roll out of a JPIC Speaker Series,
- "Living the Franciscan Charism," a 2026 St. Margaret of Cortona Region spiritual retreat with a JPIC theme, on June 5 – 7,
- a working group meeting for Fraternity JPIC Animators in the fall, and
- numerous other opportunities to share, listen, and engage.

As we make these "daily choices," let us ask for the intercession of our Seraphic Father Francis, our Holy Mother Clare, and Mary, our Mother Queen of the Seraphic Order, to be inspired by and faithful to Catholic Social Teaching and the Secular Franciscan Rule in all aspects of our professed lives.

FAN LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE INSPIRES STUDENTS

Congratulations to Franciscan Action Network (FAN) for a successful 2025 Franciscan Justice Leadership Conference in Washington, DC, in October. The conference drew 150 participants from across the country, including students from nine Franciscan universities, and also 26 various Franciscan institutions, including many Franciscan religious communities. Dr. Vanessa White, OFS, author and Associate Professor at Catholic Theological Union in Chicago, delivered the keynote address "Moved by the Spirit: Love, Hope, and Justice in Action." 
